- 1 Study these inscriptions and answer the questions.

For the Emperor Caesar Trajan Hadrian Augustus, son of the deified Trajan conqueror of Parthia, grandson of the deified Nerva, *pontifex maximus*, in his fourteenth year of tribunician power, three times consul, father of his country, the *civitas* of the Cornovii (*set this up*).

Wroxeter forum dedication, fragments of a commemorative slab found to the east of the main entrance to the forum; AD 129–130.

In honour of the Divine House of the Emperor Caesar Titus Aelius Hadrianus Antoninus Augustus Pius, father of his country, three times consul, and to the Divine Powers of the emperor, Marcus Ulpius Ianuarius, councillor of the *vicus* of Petuaria, presented this new stage at his own expense.

Brough-on-Humber (Petuaria) dedication slab near west wall of building I; AD 139–44.

To Tiberius Claudius Paulinus, legate of the Second Legion Augusta, proconsul of the province of Narbonensis, governor of the province of Lugudunensis, by decree of the council, the commonwealth of the *civitas* of the Silures (*set this up*).


Pedestal which probably held a statue of Tiberius Claudius Paulinus, Caerwent; shortly before AD 220.

- (a) How useful are these inscriptions in illustrating the spread of urbanisation in Roman Britain? [25]
- (b) How far does other available evidence support the view that urban life was widespread in Roman Britain? [25]
