CARTER: <i>The Bloody Chamber</i> (Vintage)</p> <p>Either:</p> <p>(a) Remind yourself of the story ‘The Courtship of Mr Lyon’. With a detailed focus on her use of language, consider how Carter conveys and develops Beauty’s perceptions and attitudes in the story.</p> <p>Your answer should consider Beauty’s perceptions of and attitudes to: her father, the Beast, her surroundings and circumstances.</p> <p>Or:</p> <p>(b) At times the stories have aspects that readers find disturbing.</p> <p>Explore what you have found disturbing in any one or two stories from the collection. Make sure that you include in your answer a major focus on Carter’s use of language and a consideration of attitudes and values that are involved.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">(Total 50 marks)</p> <hr/> <p>2. MAUGHAM: <i>Collected Short Stories. Volume One</i> (Vintage)</p> <p>Either:</p> <p>(a) Explore Maugham’s use of language in the story ‘The Fall of Edward Barnard’ to present Edward Barnard and his attitudes and values.</p> <p>In your answer you should include some consideration of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • the changes in Edward Barnard’s attitudes and values during the course of the story • his attitudes to others, and to Chicago and Tahiti • how he is perceived by the narrator, Bateman Hunter. <p>Or:</p> <p>(b) Choose any one story in the collection which is set, wholly or partly, in a far-off country, where the foreign setting plays a significant part in the story. Explore Maugham’s use of language to convey the nature and significance of the setting, and attitudes and values relating to it and to characters living there.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">(Total 50 marks)</p>	Leave blank

<p>3. JOYCE: <i>Dubliners</i> (Penguin)</p> <p>Either:</p> <p>(a) What significance have you found in the story ‘Clay’? What do you think Joyce is trying to convey in the story?</p> <p>Make sure that your answer considers Joyce’s use of language to convey the meaning or significance, and the attitudes and values that are explored.</p> <p>Or:</p> <p>(b) ‘Although misery and melancholy pervade the stories in <i>Dubliners</i>, there is also much that is more light-hearted or even funny.’</p> <p>Choose two different stories and explore some aspects which are light-hearted. In your answer you should consider Joyce’s use of language to convey the light-heartedness, and the attitudes and/or values that are involved.</p>	<p>Leave blank</p> <p>(Total 50 marks)</p>
<p>4. MUNRO: <i>Selected Stories</i> (Vintage)</p> <p>Either:</p> <p>(a) The story ‘Material’ conveys a wide variety of perceptions, attitudes, judgements and values. With a focus on Munro’s use of language, explore some of these that you have found most interesting and meaningful in the story.</p> <p>Your answer should include some consideration of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • perceptions of Dotty • the narrator’s attitudes to Hugo and to his writing. <p>Or:</p> <p>(b) Many of Munro’s stories do not have a continuous narrative, but consist instead of a collection of fragments.</p> <p>Choose any one story from the collection that is constructed of ‘fragments’, and, with a focus on Munro’s use of language, explore how these fragments convey attitudes and values and contribute to the story’s overall meaning or significance.</p>	<p>(Total 50 marks)</p>
