1 **JANE AUSTEN:** *Pride and Prejudice*

- **EITHER** (a) Look again at Chapter 18. Then respond to the tasks.
 - (i) What do you learn about the character of Mr Wickham in this chapter?
 - (ii) Write about the ways Austen tells the story in this chapter.
 - (iii) Some readers have commented on Mr Wickham's importance to the structure of the novel. What do you think is important about his character and role in the whole of *Pride and Prejudice*?
- **OR** (b) Look again at Chapter 41. Then answer the questions.
 - (i) What different attitudes to Lydia's going to Brighton are revealed in this chapter?
 - (ii) How does Austen tell the story in this chapter?
 - (iii) It has been said that Austen uses holidays to shape *Pride and Prejudice*. What do you think is significant about holidays in the whole novel?

2 EMILY BRONTË: Wuthering Heights

- **EITHER** (a) Look again at Chapter 32. Then answer the questions.
 - (i) What do you learn about the character of Hareton in this chapter?
 - (ii) How does Brontë tell the story in this chapter?
 - (iii) Some readers have rejoiced at Hareton's triumph over his environment and over Heathcliff. What do you think is important about his character and role in the whole of *Wuthering Heights*?
- **OR** (b) Look again at Chapter 12. Then respond to the tasks.
 - (i) What do you learn about Catherine's state of mind in this chapter?
 - (ii) Write about the ways Brontë tells the story in this chapter.
 - (iii) Some readers of *Wuthering Heights* see Catherine as a tragic heroine. What do you think about this idea?

3 MARK TWAIN: Huckleberry Finn

- **EITHER** (a) Look again at the last two chapters of *Huckleberry Finn*. Then respond to the tasks.
 - (i) What do you learn about Huck's relationship with other characters in these chapters?
 - (ii) Write about Twain's methods of telling the story in these chapters.
 - (iii) Some readers feel that the final chapters are a compromise which destroys the moral intensity of the novel. What do you think about the ending of the novel?
- **OR** (b) Look again at Chapter 19. Then answer the questions.
 - (i) What different feelings does Huck experience in this chapter?
 - (ii) How does Twain tell the story in this chapter?
 - (iii) Some readers have said that the charm of *Huckleberry Finn* is that it reveals a lost world of freedom and innocence. What do you think?

4 ALICE WALKER: *The Color Purple*

- **EITHER** (a) Look again at Letters 1, 2, 3, 4 and 83 (pages 3–6 and pages 209–212 of The Women's Press edition). Then respond to the tasks.
 - (i) What is revealed about Celie's character in these letters?
 - (ii) Compare the style of the first four Letters with that of Letter 83.
 - (iii) Some readers feel that the epistolary method of writing *The Color Purple* is what makes the novel so appealing to readers. What do you think about Walker's use of letters in the whole novel?
- **OR** (b) Look again at Letter 73 (pages 164–168 of The Women's Press edition). Then respond to the tasks.
 - (i) What different attitudes to God are revealed in Celie's letter?
 - (ii) Write about the ways Walker tells the story in this letter.
 - (iii) *The Color Purple* has been said to describe a spiritual journey. What do you think is important about religion and faith in the whole of the novel?
- 5 ANTHONY BURGESS: A Clockwork Orange
 - **EITHER** (a) Look again at Chapter 1 in Part II. Then respond to the tasks.
 - (i) What choices does Alex consider in this chapter?
 - (ii) Write about Burgess's story-telling methods in this chapter.
 - (iii) The prison chaplain claims that "When a man cannot choose he ceases to be a man". How important do you think the subject of choice is to the whole of *A Clockwork Orange*?
 - **OR** (b) Look again at Chapter 3 in Part II. Then answer the questions.
 - (i) What different attitudes are shown in this chapter to Alex's treatment?
 - (ii) How does Burgess present Alex in this chapter?
 - (iii) "In *A Clockwork Orange* Burgess is opening up a debate on the ethics of scientific experimentation." What do you think about this claim?

6 IAN McEWAN: *Enduring Love*

- **EITHER** (a) Look again at Chapter 13. Then answer the questions.
 - (i) What do you learn about the character of Jean Logan in this chapter?
 - (ii) How does McEwan tell the story in this chapter?
 - (iii) "Jean Logan is one of a number of minor characters who create little interest for the reader." What do you think about the minor characters in the novel as a whole?
- **OR** (b) Look again at Chapter 4. Then answer the questions.
 - (i) What is revealed of Joe's interest in science in this chapter?
 - (ii) How does McEwan tell the story in Chapter 4?
 - (iii) Some readers are impressed by the focus on science in *Enduring Love*. How do you respond to the treatment of science in the whole novel?

7 GRAHAM SWIFT: Waterland

- **EITHER** (a) Look again at Chapters 1 and 8. Then respond to the tasks.
 - (i) What do these chapters reveal about Tom Crick's views of story-telling?
 - (ii) Write about Swift's narrative methods in these chapters.
 - (iii) Some readers think that *Waterland* is an exploration of why stories are told. What do you think?
- **OR** (b) Look again at Chapter 9. Then respond to the tasks.
 - (i) What do you learn about Sarah and Thomas Atkinson in this chapter?
 - (ii) Write about the language and structure of this chapter.
 - (iii) Some readers find the chapters dealing with the Atkinsons' history to be a tedious digression. What do you think?
