Extract A

Tweet lands Twitter user in jail

A computer geek in Guatemala has become one of the first in the world to be arrested for Tweeting.

Jean Anleu was so tired with corruption in his country that he decided to vent his feeling with a 96-character message on the social-networking site.

The message, or tweet, has now earned him a potential five-year prison sentence. Mr Anleu urged depositors to pull their money from Guatemala's rural development bank, whose management has been challenged in a political scandal. He illegally undermined public trust in Guatemala's banking system, according to prosecutor Genaro Pacheco. Authorities proved Mr Anleu sent the message by searching his Guatemala City home, and then put him in prison with kidnappers, extortionists and other dangerous criminals for a day and a half before letting him out on bail.

His lawyer, Jose Toledo, believes the government wants to make an example of him.

"Clearly, the message was: Watch out, any of you guys that want to post messages, this can happen to you. ... It was a dissuasive measure," Mr Toledo said.

Extract B

John Prescott's Tweeting

Blogging every day can be a bit hard when you've got other work to do. I haven't updated my own blog for a while. But I have kept tweeting. The "140 characters or less rule" is a challenge for me but the limit is a great discipline. You can get your message across just as well as in a big blog post. In fact, less is more. Just look at "tough on crime, tough on the causes of crime". It comes in at under 45.

So I had to smile at Cameron's radio interview about Twitter yesterday. He says he doesn't use it. I find it ironic that he didn't think about what he had to say before swearing live on air. If he'd tweeted it, he could have deleted it! He certainly looked like he was thinking on his feet trying to come up with the "right" reply.

But I think Cameron's missing a trick here. I've found Twitter is a great way of getting my opinions across and just as importantly, to read and respond to what other people are saying. The big benefit is having that two-way conversation. I first discovered this with Facebook. It really helped our campaign against Royal Bank of Scotland's bankers' bonuses because people were able to instantly message me to contradict the bank's position that cashiers would be hit by axing the bonuses.

It's a great channel for whistleblowers, especially in a 24-hour news environment.

And I don't have to worry about being misquoted. I publish myself. More and more politicians are blogging, logging and tweeting. Interestingly, according to the Hansard Society, MPs like me born before 1940 are more likely to blog than their younger colleagues.
