- (a) Why was there tension between Elizabeth and her Parliaments? [25]
- (b) Why did opposition to Elizabeth from her Council and Parliament always fall short of open revolt? [25]

- (a) Why did many Irish people support Home Rule by 1914? [25]

- (a) Why was Lloyd George a more effective war leader than Asquith? [25]
- (b) Why did the Coalition Government continue after the end of the war? [25]
