## Answer Question 1 and either Question 2 or Question 3.

1 Read Sources A, B and C and answer parts (a) to (d) which follow.

#### Source A

The small market town of Nantborough lies in the heart of the beautiful countryside of Southland. Although primarily based on farming and tourism, the local economy also has a major manufacturing plant owned by Fyreborg (USA), employing over 400 workers and situated on the edge of the town. The Fyreborg Corporation is a multi-national corporation with manufacturing plants in eleven different countries, mostly in the Far East.

Nantborough is connected by a good dual carriageway road to the large city of Oldcastle, which is about 20 miles away. There are also very good rail links between Nantborough and Oldcastle, as well as a regional airport some 15 miles from Nantborough. This excellent transport network has meant that the town has started to expand as more and more people move there in order to commute into Oldcastle.

#### Source B

## Fyreborg Plant to Close with Loss of 300 Jobs

The Fyreborg Corporation yesterday announced that production at its Nantborough plant would cease in two months time. Management said that production costs at similar plants in the Far East were less than a third of production costs in Britain and that it had no other choice but to transfer the bulk of its UK production to its operations overseas. Fyreborg will maintain a research and development unit at the Nantborough plant, but the closure of the main production line would mean the loss of 300, mainly semi-skilled, manual jobs.

#### Source C

### Press Release: Joint Trades Union Negotiating Committee Fyreborg Plant

At a mass meeting of workers at the threatened Fyreborg plant in Nantborough, there was unanimous support for a campaign against the management decision to axe 300 jobs. Workers at the plant, represented by three trade unions, have decided to set up an action group to co-ordinate this campaign. A union representative stated that, "The decision to keep the research and development unit at Nantborough, but transfer the manual jobs outside the UK, smacks of a divide and rule strategy by Fyreborg". A further meeting, at which possible courses of action will be discussed, is planned for tomorrow.

- (b) Examine some of the ways in which the community of Nantborough is likely to be affected by the redundancies at Fyreborg. (10 marks)
- (c) Examine how the media are likely to cover the issue of the threatened closure of the Fyreborg plant. (12 marks)
- (d) Identify some of the ways the trade unions at the Fyreborg plant could campaign against the proposed job cuts **and** assess how likely these ways are to be successful. (14 marks)

- 2 (a) Examine some of the ways in which the behaviour of individuals is influenced by the socialisation process. (10 marks)
  - (b) Examine some of the differences in life-chances between men and women. (10 marks)
  - (c) Assess the claim that the mass media exert little influence on the way people think and behave.

- 3 (a) Examine some of the ways in which governments have tried to reduce discrimination in Britain.

  (10 marks)
  - (b) Examine some of the ways in which different groups of pupils may be treated unequally by the education system. (10 marks)
