2(a)(i)	<p>Up to 4 marks available for description</p> <p>e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Both require a valid passport (1) • Passport must have a validity exceeding 6 months (1) after the date of entry in Zambia(1) • The passport must have two blank pages(1) • Zambia does not recognise dual nationality (1) and you must have a passport bearing the exit stamp (1) from the country you have come from. 	<p>before travelling to Zambia(1)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Further information contact Zambian High Commission London(1) or visit Zambian Dept for Immigration(1) • On leaving Zambia, non-residents pay departure tax of US\$25(1) • It is possible to obtain a double entry visa at ports (1) for \$80 (1)

3(b)	Up to 4 marks available for explanation. Max 2 marks for description. e.g. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • This type of event had never happened before(1) so insurance companies could not look at what had happened in the past(1) • In some insurance companies they said this was an act of god(1) and when that happens they are not deemed responsible as it is out of their hands(1) • It was difficult for the insurance companies to blame anyone for this event(1) and therefore usually when there is no one to blame(1) it is considered an act of god(1) • This was such a huge event (1) that insurance companies knew they were going to lose a lot of money (1) and were trying to avoid doing this (1). 3(c)	<p>Up to 2 marks available for each realistic recommendation. Up to 2 marks available for each justification. Recommendations must be different otherwise answer will only be credited once.</p> <p>e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The government must set out procedural guidelines (1) that will take place in future for 'out of the normal' events (1). This will mean that all customers involved in an event will know what procedures are in place(1) and when to expect action and how to prepare for this(1) • Improve communication (1) between the government and the airline industry (1). This will mean that customers know who is making decisions (1) and that both sides will be represented (1) and understand why decisions are being taken and the effect (1). • Tell customers what is happening(1) perhaps through TV broadcasts(1) so people know what is happening (1) and can plan better(1). 4(a)	<p>Up to 4 marks available for explanation. Max 2 marks for description.</p> <p>e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Holidays are booked often ages in advance(1) • It is difficult to know what could happen in the meantime before you go (1) such as illness or redundancy (1). • Travel arrangements tend to be expensive (1) so people cannot afford 	(4)

	to just lose money if something happens (1). It means customers are covered(1) and will get treatment/money back if something goes wrong(1)

4(b)	<p>Up to 3 marks available for explanation.</p> <p>e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Holiday cancellation occurs before the person goes away(1) • Whereas curtailment is whilst you are away (1). So if a close relative dies before you travel you would cancel your holiday and not go (1) but if away and you need to come home you have had some holiday but have had to shorten it to get back(1) 	(3)

4(c)	<p>Up to 6 marks available for explanation. Max 2 marks for description.</p> <p>e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No they will not be covered(1) • The maximum cash that can be insured is £100 per person(1) and the Shahs' had £300 in their deposit box so it will not all be covered(1) • Tesco insurance will not pay the full cost of either the ring (1) or the money (1). This is because although the Shahs' did the right thing by keeping them in their safety deposit box(1) as stipulated in the policy(1) the insurance will only cover one thing up to the cost of £200(1) and Nikki's ring is worth £600(1). 4(d)	<p>Up to 2 marks available for each realistic recommendation. Up to 2 marks available for each justification. Recommendations must be different otherwise answer will only be credited once.</p> <p>e.g. Recommendation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Getting a police report and number(1) • Always read the insurance conditions(1) of the premium you have taken out(1) • Follow all the instructions given in the insurance(1) such as keeping your valuables in a hotel safe(1) <p>Justification</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Otherwise you won't get any money back(1) • This is because you will then know what you are covered for(1) and can only take the cash out that you would be covered for(1) • This means you have done what the insurance company has asked you to(1) so they will pay out when you have to make your claim 	(8)
