Read **Item A** below and answer all the questions that follow.

Item A

Refugees are often represented by the media as a miserable 'sea of humanity'. We often see (usually white) United Nations officials surrounded by crowds of black people who appear to be waiting passively for assistance from outsiders. The officials give us details of the numbers of refugees, and their birth and mortality rates. The officials try to be informative and honest, but they prevent us having direct knowledge of the refugees' own experiences. This is because the refugees themselves are silenced and turned into speechless victims in need of humanitarian assistance from international organisations.

The media representations of refugees present us with crowds of raw, helpless humanity to be explained, objectified and managed by the experts. Such images prevent any individual refugee stepping forward from the crowd and directly talking to the camera: "Now, Sir/Madam, there is much that you have not considered. There are many details about our history that might assist you in helping us."
