AD02 Investigation of 3D visual language

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AD02 - Investigation of 3D visual language

ADO2 requires candidates to carry out investigations and develop 3D visual language skills in a vocational context. The responses to this unit have improved over the last two years although the work is still weaker than that produced for ADO1. There was some interesting ceramic work seen this year as well as 3D work on a larger scale. Some of the 3D outcomes were excellent and showed an imaginative use of materials such as wire, ceramics, glass and card and in some centres a wide range of 3D materials and processes were in evidence.

There are, however, still centres that limit the range of 3D experiences only just fulfilling the requirements of the unit. Where a theme or brief allowed for experimentation with different processes, this appeared to be more successful and gave candidates an opportunity to investigate different media. Some candidates concentrated too much on trying to create a final outcome and this is not required at this level.

ADO2 requires use of 3D visual language based on both primary and secondary sources (as outlined in the strap line accompanying the Assessment Criteria) and this was not always evident. Primary drawing, photography and research are a valuable way to start a project and should be encouraged.

There were some strong examples of sketchbook work to record sources and explore 3D visual language as well as to investigate and develop alternative ideas.

Evaluation for AD02 was weaker than evaluation seen in work for AD01 and lacked analysis; although in this particular unit a summative evaluation is not specified. Formative evaluation through annotation which explained the effectiveness of the work and suggested improvements was the most valuable.
