- Practical responses to the work of other artists, designers and craftspeople must show development in a **personal** way.
- The work submitted for this unit must be produced **unaided**.
- You must not produce work for this unit after the 15 hours of supervised time.

- All questions carry equal marks.
- This paper assesses your understanding of the relationship between the different aspects of Art and Design (Photography).
- There is no size restriction on work produced for this paper.

- You may use any appropriate photographic media, method(s) and materials, unless the question states otherwise.

This paper will test your ability to:

- develop ideas through sustained and focused investigations informed by contextual and other sources, demonstrating analytical and critical understanding
- experiment with and select appropriate resources, media, materials, techniques and processes, reviewing and refining ideas as your work develops
- record in visual and/or other forms, ideas, observations and insights relevant to intentions, demonstrating an ability to reflect on your work and progress
- present a personal, informed and meaningful response demonstrating critical understanding, realising intentions and, where appropriate, making connections between visual, written, oral or other elements.

The questions below should be seen as starting points for personal investigations in which you make reference to appropriate critical and contextual material.

Choose one of the following questions.

1 Approaches to Landscape

The landscape is a popular subject for many photographers. Sometimes they select unexpected subject matter or produce images using unusual techniques. You might like to consider the industrial landscapes of Edward Burtynsky or the panoramic views of Tom Curley. Investigate appropriate examples and produce a personal response.

2 Mixed Media

Many photographers and artists have explored the idea of working with a range of media when producing images. Sally Mankus and Robert Rauschenberg have worked in this way. Investigate this approach and produce a personal response.

3 Ways of Seeing

Photographers occasionally choose to represent the familiar in distinctive ways which challenge traditional ways of seeing. You might like to consider the *Cowscapes* of Rachael Sudlow or the close-up work of Bill Brandt. Look at appropriate examples and produce your own work.

4 Colour

Some subjects are best seen in colour. Examples can be seen in the work of Martin Parr, William Eggleston and Matt Stuart. Research appropriate examples and produce your own images where colour is a striking and essential feature.

5 Natural Forms

The variety of forms in the natural world has provided inspiration for a number of photographers. Diverse approaches can be seen in the work of Tina Modotti, Edward Weston and Karl Blossfeldt. Explore this theme and create a personal response.

6 Viewpoint

Careful consideration of viewpoint can emphasise the less obvious elements of an object or place. Edward Steichen, Berenice Abbott and Alexander Rodchenko have sometimes created striking images by selecting a viewpoint in order to emphasise perspective. Look at appropriate examples and create your own response.

7 New Realities

The digital work of Catherine McIntyre and the black and white images of Clarence John Laughlin demonstrate the potential of different approaches to create new realities and to sometimes produce surprising images. Consider appropriate examples and techniques and produce your own images.

8 Images within Images

The idea of an image which exists within another image has been explored by a number of photographers. Lee Friedlander and Michael Hughes have both employed this idea. Consider examples and produce a personal response.
