Evidence A

One city – two tales

Take a train to London Euston, wander through the Georgian streets close by and soon you might discover two very different enterprises.

African Kitchen

The African Kitchen in Drummond Street is an intimate and cosy value for money restaurant which provides dining for up to 24 customers. It was established in 2003 by friends Antonio and Akim.



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Antonio, originally from Cadiz in Spain, manages the business and provides the customer service required, from welcoming clients, arranging bookings, serving, to taking payments. Antonio used to work for many years as the chief host and waiter at the prestigious Savoy hotel.

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Antonio used to serve a number of celebrities including members of the royal family; this probably explains Antonio's professionalism and attention to finer detail.

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Akim is the cook who, given his Nigerian origin, prepares a range of African and Caribbean dishes such as spicy plantation beef, hot jerk chicken, curried goat, ackee and saltfish. Akim is very keen to cater for special dietary requirements, ensuring that all products are gluten and dairy free and have no artificial flavourings or preservatives.

African Kitchen is more than just a restaurant because it sells a range of traditional African sculptures, textiles and jewellery which complement the exotic and tropical atmosphere. Furthermore, Time Out London magazine recommends that the best time to visit African Kitchen is during the summer; if you sit at one of the tables in the outdoor patio section of the restaurant it is the perfect spot to enjoy one of Antonio's freshly made ginger beers or mango juices.

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The Charles Dickens Museum



Close to London's Holborn station, you will discover the Charles Dickens Museum at 48 Doughty Street. This is where Victorian novelist Dickens lived from 1837 until 1839. Two of his daughters were born here and his best-loved books were written here, including *Oliver Twist* and *Nicholas Nickleby*.

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In 1923, long after the Dickens family moved, the house was threatened with demolition, so the Dickens Fellowship acquired it. The Museum became a registered charity, which opened in 1925 and has become the world's finest Dickens-related collection.

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
