Barthes suggested that signs signify (operate) on a number of levels, which he called "levels of signification" (denotation, connotation, myth and ideology). Explore in detail the levels of signification at which this text operates. *(30 marks)*

Language use will show competence and accuracy although range may be limited, especially in terms of technical vocabulary. Some evidence of a detailed semiotic analysis of the text and a recognition of the potential for different levels of meaning. Some consideration of 'myth' and/or ideology is expected here.	(13–16 marks)
3 (5-6 marks)	Candidates communicate competent awareness and understanding of the categories, forms and uses of communication as applied to contemporary life. Language will be clear despite inaccuracies and limitations and/or some evidence of a technical vocabulary or register will be offered.	Candidates demonstrate satisfactory evidence of application of critical reading techniques. 'Signification' will be discussed with reasonable accuracy and will be applied in a straightforward yet accurate way to the text. A principally semiotics-led/influenced commentary will be offered. An evidenced understanding of 'denotation' and 'connotation' will invariably be offered.	(9–12 marks)
