0 3	How important to Alexander was the acquisition of money and other treasure from his conquests? [10 marks]
0 4	To what extent was Alexander punishing the Persians for their invasion of Greece and to what extent was he pursuing his own aims in his conquest of Persia? Support your answer by referring to both Arrian and Plutarch. [20 marks]

As a sign of mourning he gave orders that the manes and tails of all horses should be shorn, demolished the battlements of all the neighbouring cities, crucified the unlucky physician and forbade the playing of flutes or any other kind of music for a long time until finally an oracle was announced from the temple of Ammon, commanding him to honour Hephaestion and sacrifice to him as a hero. To lighten his sorrow he set off on a campaign, as if the tracking down and hunting of men might console him, and he subdued the tribe of the Cossaeans.
