#### Scenario



*Happy Hols* is a new travel agency based in Llandrindod Wells. The travel agency offers a variety of different holiday types to its customers.

*Happy Hols* wishes to offer its customers the facility of being able to book their holidays using a computerised booking system. When a customer wishes to book a holiday, they can access holiday details via an interactive kiosk at the agency or by speaking to a member of staff who will access holiday details for the customer.

This new system will store details of customers along with details of the different holiday types that are available, such as all-inclusive, luxury, family, beach, ski and cruise holidays.

The main requirements of the new computer system for *Happy Hols* are:

- The ability to store and search customer details
- The ability to store holiday details and search for holidays using various preferences, e.g. search for all "ski" holidays or all "5 star" rated holidays
- The ability to store bookings for each customer

*Happy Hols* has provided the following partially completed entity-relationship diagram as an overview of the system they would like to create:

#### Section A: Analysis and Design (44 marks)

You have been asked to analyse the scenario as a preliminary step towards creating a computer system for *Happy Hols*.

Answer all questions. Present your answers as a single word-processed document named *Section A - Analysis and Design*.

- 1. Draw two data structure tables that will allow *Happy Hols* to store customer and holiday details. [10]
- 2. Copy and **complete** the entity relationship diagram provided in the scenario. [6]
- **3.** Construct a flowchart for the process of searching for a specific holiday, e.g. a Cruise. [6]
- 4. Select and fully justify your proposed method of solution for the three main requirements listed in the scenario. [6]
- 5. Different modes of operation are used for processing data in different operating systems.

**Happy Hols** will have to consider different modes of operation that will affect their holiday booking system. Suggest **one** suitable and **one** unsuitable mode of operation for this system and justify your answers. [8]

Happy Hols stores the details of its holidays in an array, which is sorted in order of price (lowest to highest).

#### HolidayArray[]:

Using a recognised convention, design an algorithm that performs a search for all the HolidayIDs that are available between two entered price ranges.

The algorithm should output the HolidayID and price for all the matches between the two prices entered. If there are no Holidays available within the price range entered the algorithm should output: "No Match Found".

For example:

If the user entered a price range of:

Lowest=250 Highest=290

then the algorithm would output:

HolidayID: 143 Price £: 255

HolidayID: 221 Price £: 275

HolidayID: 455 Price £: 285
