What is the difference between ICT/IT Skills and Computing?

IT and ICT focus on developing competencies for the computer user, whereas Computing is intended for students who wish to learn about computer systems and programming, rather than about the application of ICT.

In the area of ICT, UCLES offers qualifications which assess skills only, in a variety of applications:

- ♦ IT Skills Awards (Foundation and Standard Level)
- ♦ ICT Career Awards (Foundation, Standard and Advanced Level)

In the discipline of Computing we offer:

- ♦ IGCSE/O Level Computer Studies
- ♦ IGCSE IT
- ♦ A/AS Computing
- ♦ Diploma in Computing

What is the difference between A/AS Computing and the Diploma in Computing?

Three out of the four modules/components are identical. The only differences are the Programming Project, which involves less advanced programming skills for the A Level.

How many hours contact time do you recommend for AS /A level?

Over a two year A level course approximately 5 hours per week of teaching time would normally be sufficient. Students will be expected to do individual work outside of this time.

Are there published mark schemes or past papers available for this syllabus?

Yes, both exam papers and mark schemes are published approx. 3 months after the exams have taken place, and are usually available through our Publications Order Form. For further information, please contact Customer Services on international@ucles.org.uk

Where can we obtain examples of 'model' answers that have been awarded the highest grades?

How do we receive the Practical Tasks question paper?

This is available from September for the June session and January for the November session. We send all registered Centres a confidential letter in August and December, containing an email address and password to access the Tasks. Once you have returned the appropriate email, you will receive an auto-reply message from CIE, with the question paper and instructions as an attachment together with a set of confidential instructions which will give information as to how the tasks should be administered.

What is the time limit for each Practical Task?

There is no stated time limit.

Should the Practical Tasks be spread over time or administered in 1 go?

You can do either. It depends entirely on their curriculum.

When will we receive the mark scheme for the Practical Tasks?

These will be available from April 1st for the June session and from October 1st for the November session, and will be automatically distributed via email to all Centres that have requested the practical tasks.

Is there a specific programming language that should be used for the Tasks or Project? Candidates may use any high level language for either.

When does the students' work for the Tasks or Project have to be submitted to CIE? By April 30th for the June session and October 31st for the November session.

Do we have to send all work for the Tasks and Project to CIE for moderation or just a sample?

All work must be sent to CIE for moderation. This is to ensure that the standard for the award of marks is the same for each centre and that each teacher has applied the same standards appropriately across the range of candidates within the centre.

How can I get in touch with other teachers of A/AS Level Computing?

We have set up an email discussion group for teachers of this syllabus, which is the ideal place to ask questions about teaching, resources or what is expected of students for this or any of the other components of the syllabus.
