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Section A: Shakespeare

Answer **one** question from this section.

Antony and Cleopatra

1 Either

(a) With detailed reference to the language and action of at least two passages, examine ways in which any two of the following contribute to the presentation of Roman values in Antony and Cleopatra: Agrippa, Menas, Ventidius, Octavia. [30]

Or

(b) Referring closely to at least two passages, examine the uses of aggressive and threatening language and behaviour in *Antony and Cleopatra*. [30]

As You Like It

2 Either

(a) What do you find distinctive and dramatically effective about the language used by Oliver and by Duke Frederick in *As You Like it*? In your answer you should make detailed reference to at least two passages. [30]

Or

(b) Examine Shakespeare's presentation of the relationship between Touchstone and Jaques in *As You Like It.* You should include reference to the linguistic detail and action of **at least two** passages in your answer. [30]

The Tempest

3 Either

(a) 'I have done nothing but in care of thee.' Examine the presentation of Prospero's relationship with Miranda in the light of his comment. You should refer to the linguistic detail and action of at least two passages in your answer. [30]

Or

(b) Referring closely to the linguistic detail and action of at least two passages from the play, explore some of the ways in which *The Tempest* is concerned with social order. [30]

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Section B: 20th Century Drama

Answer one question from this section.

Samuel Beckett Waiting for Godot

4 Either

(a) Vladimir exclaims: 'Let us not waste our time in idle discourse!' How far and in what ways, in your view, do the characters in *Waiting for Godot* waste their time? In your answer you should refer closely to the linguistic detail and dramatic effects of **at least two** passages from the play.

Or

(b) Pozzo: (He kicks Lucky) Up pig!

Referring closely to **at least two** passages, examine the language of insult and humiliation in *Waiting for Godot*. [30]

Brian Friel *Translations*

5 Either

(a) Examine the presentation of the relationship between Owen and Manus. In your answer you should make close reference to the linguistic detail and dramatic methods of **at least two** passages. [30]

Or

(b) Hugh says: '... it is not the literal past, the "facts" of history that shape us, but images of the past embodied in language.' Referring closely to the linguistic detail and action of at least two passages, examine the significance of the past in *Translations*. [30]

Tennessee Williams A Streetcar Named Desire

6 Either

(a) Blanche talks to Stella about the civilising influence of 'Such things as art – as poetry and music.' How far and in what ways does Blanche's own use of language reflect such influences? In your answer you should include detailed reference to at least two passages. [30]

Or

(b) Stella questions Stanley: 'How much longer is this game going to continue?' Examine the significance of games and play in *A Streetcar Named Desire*. In your answer you should refer closely to the language and action of **at least two** passages. [30]

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
