OR

3 Remind yourself of Act 3 Scene 3, beginning with Cleopatra's line "Where is the fellow?" and Act 3 Scene 4, ending with Antony's line"Choose your own company, and command what cost Your heart has mind to."

What do you find interesting about these **two** scenes? You should refer to both subject matter and style.

OR

4 With reference to **two** or **three** episodes, explore Shakespeare's dramatic use of deception in the play.

The Taming of the Shrew – William Shakespeare

OR

5 Look again at Act 2 Scene 1, from the stage direction at the beginning "Enter Katherina and Bianca with her hands tied" to about line 105 when Baptista says to Tranio
"By report
I know him well. You are very welcome, sir"

I know him well. You are very welcome, sir."

Consider the dramatic function of this episode within the play.

OR

6 How do you respond to the ways Shakespeare presents ideas about property and ownership in the play?

You may confine yourself to two or three episodes or range more widely, if you prefer.
