- show detailed critical understanding in analysing the ways in which the writer uses narrative point of view, structure, language (including imagery) and tones to shape meanings (AO2)

Section A

Answer **one** question in this section.

1 War: The Things They Carried

StudentBounty.com By close analysis of extract **1**, printed in the accompanying Resource Booklet, taking account of narrative methods - narrative point of view, structure, language (including imagery) and tones – show how effective you think O'Brien has been in showing how a soldier deals with the memories of war.

2 Women in Society: The Illusionist

By close analysis of extract **2**, printed in the accompanying Resource Booklet, taking account of narrative methods - narrative point of view, structure, language (including imagery) and tones – show how effective you think Johnston has been in presenting the relationship between the woman and her husband.

3 The Outsider: The Butcher Boy

By close analysis of extract **3**, printed in the accompanying Resource Booklet, taking account of narrative methods - narrative point of view, structure, language (including imagery) and tones - show how effective you think McCabe has been in writing about the encounter between Dr. Roche and the outsider, Francie Brady.

4 Childhood: Paddy Clarke Ha Ha Ha

By close analysis of extract 4, printed in the accompanying Resource Booklet, taking account of narrative methods - narrative point of view, structure, language (including imagery) and tones – show how effective you think Doyle has been in presenting events from a child's point of view.

Section B: Comparison of two novels on the same theme as that chosen

- demonstrate understanding of the context in which texts are written and received by drawing on appropriate information from outside the novels (AO4)
- respond to a stimulus statement which expresses a particular reading of the two novels (AO3)
- sustain a comparison/contrast of the two novels (AO3)

1 War

By comparing and contrasting appropriately selected parts of the two novels you have studied for this question, show how far you would agree with the view expressed above. Your argument should include relevant comments on each writer's methods and relevant external contextual information on the nature of warfare at the times these novels were written.

2 Women in Society

In these novels, the difficulties which women experience in their sexual and marital relationships are never simply due to the clash of individual personalities but rather the situation of women in society.

By comparing and contrasting appropriately selected parts of the two novels you have studied for this question, show how far you would agree with the view expressed above. Your **argument** should include relevant comments on each writer's **methods** and **relevant** external contextual information on the situation of women in the societies relating to each of these novels

3 The Outsider

The twenty-first century reader is always on the side of the outsider.

By **comparing and contrasting** appropriately selected parts of the two novels you have studied for this guestion, show how far you would agree with the view expressed above. Your argument should include relevant comments on each writer's methods and relevant external contextual information on the twenty-first century reader.

4 Childhood

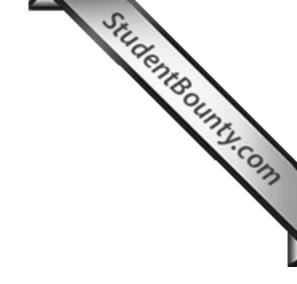
The novels you have studied offer a serious challenge to traditional ideas about childhood.




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
