- 3** 'The novel ends with a picture of family life happily restored.'

In the light of this statement, explore the extent to which the novel might be seen as portraying the break up and satisfactory restoration of family life.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

OR

- 4** 'This is a novel that explores corruption at both personal and political levels.'

In the light of this statement, explore the ways Hosseini makes links between corruption in individuals and corruption in the wider world.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

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Life of Pi – Yann Martel

EITHER

- 5 'This is a novel which is concerned with hunger in both the literal and metaphorical senses of the word.'

In the light of this statement explore Martel's presentation of hunger as a driving force in the novel.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

(Total for Question 5 = 25 marks)

OR

- 6 'It is important that we have a picture of Pi from the people who actually meet and observe him.'

In the light of this statement explore the contribution made to the novel by the anonymous author who tells Pi's story and the Japanese investigators who question Pi.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

(Total for Question 6 = 25 marks)

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The White Tiger – Aravind Adiga

EITHER

- 7** *'The White Tiger* aims its most effective satire at the political system in India.'

In the light of this statement, explore the methods used by Adiga to attack and ridicule the political system in India.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

(Total for Question 7 = 25 marks)

OR

- 8** 'Balram's narrative takes the form of a pompous and grandly written series of letters to the Chinese premier: this makes him appear self-important and deluded.'

In the light of this statement, explore the ways in which Adiga exposes Balram's flaws.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

(Total for Question 8 = 25 marks)

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Brooklyn – Colm Tóibín

EITHER

- 9** 'Although Eilis moves to Brooklyn, she never really leaves Ireland totally behind.'

In the light of this statement, explore the ways in which Tóibín presents the lingering influence of Ireland on Eilis' life in the United States.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

(Total for Question 9 = 25 marks)

OR

- 10** 'The novel shows the importance of the supporting communities that Eilis encounters.'

In the light of this statement, explore the ways in which Tóibín presents society and its influence in *Brooklyn*.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

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***Purple Hibiscus* – Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie**

EITHER

- 11** 'In a novel of contrasts, a prime example is the contrast between two priests: one who belongs to the present and the other who looks back to the past.'

In the light of this statement, explore Adichie's presentation of contrast through the figures of Father Benedict and Father Amadi.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

- 12** 'This is a story about awakening.'

In the light of this statement, explore Adichie's presentation of developing awareness.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.
