# Miss World dinosaur should be put to sleep

IGHTY Miss World contestants fleeing riot-riven Nigeria descend on Britain. What could be more cheering, you ask, than a bevy of firm-breasted beauties flying in to provide an oasis of much-needed diversion as we hunker down for the umpteenth winter of our discontent.

10 17m also tempted to agree with you. Political correctness is such a bore. Is there truly anything contemptible about 80 finely honed vital statistics wending their bikiniclad path up the catwalk and gurgling about 15 animal welfare and world peace?

I'm tempted to say what the heck! Let cleavage commence. I'm tempted to trot out the old canard about these being adult women and it being their God-given right 20 to wiggle and giggle for personal and financial advancement if they so choose. I'm tempted but, as the mother of two daughters aged 13 and 16, I can't quite manage to laugh off this flesh-based cattle 25 market as innocuous. It isn't.

The idea that there is only one kind of desirable woman — the kind who can squeeze the largest acreage of chest into the smallest bikini without tripping on her 30 stilettos — is pernicious and destructive. It sends out an overwhelmingly resounding message to our kids. Personality, hard work, talent, tenacity, compassion and simply being part of the human race are 35 not nearly enough. If your gene pool equips you with short, dumpy legs, a pigeon chest, protruding stomach or a pendulous derriere, forget it. You're already behind in the race and you haven't even started yet.

40 You try suggesting that for every 20 men who gravitate, panting, towards Barbie Doll, Miss World contestant-style women, there will be one or two who would genuinely prefer to swap a perfect curve or

45 two for freckles, cellulite and some decent conversation.

You try feeding your children a balanced meal when they see exaggerated slimness promoted as the only permissible shape. 50 You try instilling in them the notion that

external appearance is only one ingredient of the many needed to create a whole, loving worthwhile person. There's little point even attempting to extol the virtues of, for example, diligence or persistence when all about them are shaking their booty, strutting their stuff and galloping home with shed-loads of prize money.

I never thought I'd join the band of 60 humourless, dungareed battle-axes who call for Miss World to be banned. That is, until I realised how much more interesting, accomplished and stimulating these crusaders are than the tycoons who make 65 cash out of showing young flesh and the women who allow them to do it.

'M NOT ashamed to align myself to the anti-Miss World lobby. This so-called pageant degrades all our 70 daughters: those who participate, those who view and those who simply absorb the fall-out. Miss World belongs with bearbaiting and cock-fighting in the archive of unacceptable entertainment.

75 How can this generation of women convincingly shatter the glass ceiling when their sisters are simpering in their smalls in front of drooling male judges?

For heaven's sake, let's move on and 80 leave this televisual dinosaur to its death throes.
