

1 Verify that 
$$\frac{1}{n^2} - \frac{1}{(n+1)^2} = \frac{2n+1}{n^2(n+1)^2}$$
. [1]

Let 
$$S_N = \sum_{r=1}^N \frac{2r+1}{r^2(r+1)^2}$$
. Express  $S_N$  in terms of  $N$ . [2]

Let 
$$S = \lim_{N \to \infty} S_N$$
. Find the least value of N such that  $S - S_N < 10^{-16}$ . [3]

## 2 Prove by mathematical induction that, for all positive integers *n*,

$$\frac{\mathrm{d}^n}{\mathrm{d}x^n} \left(\frac{1}{2x+3}\right) = (-1)^n \frac{n! 2^n}{(2x+3)^{n+1}}.$$

## 3 The equation

$$x^3 + 5x^2 - 3x - 15 = 0$$

has roots  $\alpha$ ,  $\beta$ ,  $\gamma$ . Find the value of  $\alpha^2 + \beta^2 + \gamma^2$ . [3]

Hence show that the matrix 
$$\begin{pmatrix} 1 & \alpha & \beta \\ \alpha & 1 & \gamma \\ \beta & \gamma & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$
 is singular. [4]

4 A curve has parametric equations

$$x = 2\sin 2t, \quad y = 3\cos 2t,$$

for  $0 < t < \frac{1}{2}\pi$ . For the point on the curve where  $t = \frac{1}{3}\pi$ , find the value of

(i) 
$$\frac{dy}{dx}$$
, [3]  $d^2y$ 

(ii) 
$$\frac{\mathrm{d}^2 y}{\mathrm{d}x^2}$$
. [4]

5 Use de Moivre's theorem to express  $\cos^4 \theta$  in the form

$$a\cos 4\theta + b\cos 2\theta + c$$
,

where *a*, *b*, *c* are constants to be found.

Hence evaluate

$$\int_0^{\frac{1}{4}\pi}\cos^4\theta\,\mathrm{d}\theta,$$

leaving your answer in terms of  $\pi$ .

6 Find the general solution of the differential equation

$$\frac{d^2x}{dt^2} + 4\frac{dx}{dt} + 4x = \sin 2t.$$
 [6]

Describe the behaviour of x as  $t \to \infty$ , justifying your answer. [2]

7 Show that 
$$\frac{d}{dt}(t(1+t^3)^n) = (3n+1)(1+t^3)^n - 3n(1+t^3)^{n-1}$$
. [3]

Let  $I_n = \int_0^1 (1+t^3)^n dt$ . Using the above result, or otherwise, show that

$$(3n+1)I_n = 2^n + 3nI_{n-1}.$$

Hence evaluate  $I_3$ .

8 The curve *C* has polar equation  $r = 1 + \sin \theta$  for  $-\frac{1}{2}\pi \le \theta \le \frac{1}{2}\pi$ . Draw a sketch of *C*. [2]

The area of the region enclosed by the initial line, the half-line  $\theta = \frac{1}{2}\pi$ , and the part of *C* for which  $\theta$  is positive, is denoted by  $A_1$ . The area of the region enclosed by the initial line, and the part of *C* for which  $\theta$  is negative, is denoted by  $A_2$ . Find the ratio  $A_1 : A_2$ , giving your answer correct to 1 decimal place. [8]

9 Find a cartesian equation of the plane  $\Pi$  containing the lines

$$\mathbf{r} = 3\mathbf{i} + \mathbf{k} + s(2\mathbf{i} + \mathbf{j} - \mathbf{k})$$
 and  $\mathbf{r} = 3\mathbf{i} - 7\mathbf{j} + 10\mathbf{k} + t(\mathbf{i} - 3\mathbf{j} + 4\mathbf{k}).$  [4]

The line *l* passes through the point *P* with position vector  $6\mathbf{i} - 2\mathbf{j} + \mathbf{k}$  and is parallel to the vector  $2\mathbf{i} + \mathbf{j} - 4\mathbf{k}$ . Find

- (i) the position vector of the point where l meets  $\Pi$ , [3]
- (ii) the perpendicular distance from P to  $\Pi$ , [3]
- (iii) the acute angle between l and  $\Pi$ . [3]
- **10** A curve *C* has equation

$$y = \frac{5(x^2 - x - 2)}{x^2 + 5x + 10}.$$

Find the coordinates of the points of intersection of C with the axes. [2]

Show that, for all real values of  $x, -1 \le y \le 15$ . [4]

Sketch *C*, stating the coordinates of any turning points and the equation of the horizontal asymptote. [7]

11 Answer only **one** of the following two alternatives.

## EITHER

The curve *C* has equation  $y = \frac{1}{3}x^{\frac{1}{2}}(3-x)$ , for  $0 \le x \le 3$ . Find the mean value of *y* with respect to *x* over the interval  $0 \le x \le 3$ . [4]

Show that

$$\frac{\mathrm{d}s}{\mathrm{d}x} = \frac{1}{2} \left( x^{-\frac{1}{2}} + x^{\frac{1}{2}} \right)$$

where s denotes arc length, and find the arc length of C.

Find the area of the surface generated when C is rotated through  $2\pi$  radians about the x-axis. [4]

#### OR

Find the eigenvalues and corresponding eigenvectors of the matrix A, where

$$\mathbf{A} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 1 & 2\\ 0 & 2 & 2\\ -1 & 1 & 3 \end{pmatrix}.$$

The linear transformation  $T : \mathbb{R}^3 \to \mathbb{R}^3$  is defined by  $\mathbf{x} \mapsto \mathbf{A}\mathbf{x}$ . Let  $\mathbf{e}$ ,  $\mathbf{f}$  be two linearly independent eigenvectors of  $\mathbf{A}$ , with corresponding eigenvalues  $\lambda$  and  $\mu$  respectively, and let  $\Pi$  be the plane, through the origin, containing  $\mathbf{e}$  and  $\mathbf{f}$ . By considering the parametric equation of  $\Pi$ , show that all points of  $\Pi$  are mapped by T onto points of  $\Pi$ . [3]

Find cartesian equations of three planes, each with the property that all points of the plane are mapped by T onto points of the same plane. [4]

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
