Mark schemes are prepared by the Principal Examiner and considered, together with the relevant questions, by a panel of subject teachers. This mark scheme includes any amendments made at the standardisation meeting attended by all examiners and is the scheme which was used by them in this examination. The standardisation meeting ensures that the mark scheme covers the candidates' responses to questions and that every examiner understands and applies it in the same correct way. As preparation for the standardisation meeting each examiner analyses a number of candidates' scripts: alternative answers not already covered by the mark scheme are discussed at the meeting and legislated for. If, after this meeting, examiners encounter unusual answers which have not been discussed at the meeting they are required to refer these to the Principal Examiner.

- **Source 3** shows passengers, area and population affected by noise around selected UK airports in 2004.
- **Source 4** shows a web page from 'climatecare', July 2006.

(d) Banded mark scheme:

Band One	7 – 9	A good response which demonstrates awareness of the limitations of the data and to whom it might be of limited value. Appropriate points/examples are chosen to help clarify arguments. The answer is well organised in a logical way with few, if any, errors of punctuation, spelling and grammar.
Band Two	4 – 6	A competent response which shows some awareness of the limitations of the data and to whom it might be of limited value. Some relevant points/examples are chosen to help clarify arguments. The answer is, for the most part, clear and adequately structured, though there may be errors of punctuation, spelling and grammar which do not hinder communication.
Band Three	1 – 3	A limited response in which only one or two basic limitations are identified. It is likely that the issue of 'to whom' will be barely addressed, if at all. Inappropriate points/examples are chosen or those selected are insufficiently explained to clarify arguments. The structure is flawed and frequent errors in punctuation, spelling and grammar may obscure points being made.
Band Four	0	No response, or no relevant information.

Limitations of data

Examples of points:

- There are other airports not mentioned in the source
- There is no indication of the type of area involved e.g. residential or rural
- It is not clear if the area represents the area of the airport or the area affected by noise
- It does not say how the population is affected or if they have complained

Of limited value to:

- pressure groups have no overall view for any further action
- the government/local authorities for planning/finance
- airport authorities have no information to help them reduce the noise levels or for comparison

Band Two	4 – 6	A competent response which shows some understanding of the issues. Some relevant points/examples are chosen to help clarify arguments. The answer is, for the most part, clear and adequately structured, though there may be errors of punctuation, spelling and grammar which do not hinder communication.
Band Three	1 – 3	A limited response in which only one or two basic issues are identified. Inappropriate points/examples are chosen or those selected are insufficiently explained to clarify arguments. The structure is flawed and frequent errors in punctuation, spelling and grammar may obscure points being made.
Band Four	0	No response or no relevant information.

Examples of points:

- Cost the rent on land may be too prohibitive in cities/towns
- **Transport** location near motorway hubs allows for easier access and reduces congestion in cities/towns
- Housing A rural location might offer a better quality of life for their workforce
- Government incentives may be available for businesses to locate in rural areas
- **Space** More available space out of towns

Band Two	5 – 8	A competent response which shows some understanding of the issues. A few relevant points/examples are chosen to help clarify arguments. The answer is, for the most part, clear and adequately structured, though there may be errors of punctuation, spelling and grammar which do not hinder communication.
Band Three	1 – 4	A limited response in which only one or two basic issues are identified. Inappropriate points/examples are chosen or those selected are insufficiently explained to clarify arguments. The structure is flawed and frequent errors in punctuation, spelling and grammar may obscure points being made.
Band Four	0	No response, or no relevant information.

Examples of points:

Agree:

- Need Source 1 shows an increasing trend for air transport
- Economy reduce costs of flights/budget airlines and more import/export by air
- Employment prospects more jobs available locally
- Travel more opportunities available

Disagree:

- Environment more atmospheric pollution and reduction of rural areas
- Infrastructure more access needed, more motorways/roads
- Cost There is a limited lifespan for the fuel supplies
- Economy the growth of money spent abroad and not in the UK

The answer is, for the most part, clear and adequately structured, though there may be errors of punctuation, spelling and grammar which do not hinder communication.

- **Energy** Green energy cannot meet all of our needs even if we are aware of its benefits

Disagree:

- Internet Source 4 shows that we can and do participate in helping up to date information is available
- Education information available in many forms
- Media coverage of any problems is instant and covered at all levels
- Government initiatives encourage us to be aware of problems
