1 Study the extract below and answer parts (a), (b) and (c) which follow.

(a) Explain the importance of the *New Hampshire Primary* referred to in the extract.

(8 marks)

- (b) Using the extract and your own knowledge, assess the functions of the National Conventions in the presidential nomination process. (12 marks)
- (c) To what extent are the Democrats and Republicans "two different coalitions with different conceptions of government and different policy objectives"? (20 marks)

## Answer either Question 2 or Question 3 or Question 4.

- 2 Evaluate the claim that although pressure groups are vital to pluralist democracy, in effect they overwhelm the political process in the USA. (40 marks)
- 3 "An outdated and antiquated device more suited to the Eighteenth Century than to the needs of the Twenty-first." Critically assess this view of the Electoral College as a device for the election of the President of the USA. (40 marks)
- 4 "The factors that influence voter choice in the USA are varied and complex." Discuss. (40 marks)
