Answer two questions.

This is a synoptic unit. You will be awarded marks for your ability to draw together the knowledge, understanding and skills which you have acquired from your study of all parts of this course.

In answering each question, candidates should draw upon the knowledge and understanding gained from their study of Government and Politics of both the UK and the United States. Where appropriate, candidates should also make references to other political systems, as well as to the European Union.

1 Discuss the view that no single theory of voting behaviour can now account for how people vote in elections. [60] 2 Discuss the relevance of political parties to modern politics. [60] 3 Examine the view that, in practice, the most important features of constitutions are to be found in statutes, conventions and judicial precedent. [60] 4 Discuss the need for institutional reform within legislatures in different political systems. [60] Discuss the view that effective formulation and delivery of policy requires a strong, decisive 5 executive. [60] 6 Examine the view that federal and devolved systems of government enhance democracy. [60] 7 Discuss whether judiciaries should be involved in political issues. [60] 8 Contrast the ways in which citizens may seek a redress of grievances in different political systems. [60]
