### **THE CONVENTIONS OF INDIVIDUAL MINISTERIAL RESPONSIBILITY AND COLLECTIVE CABINET RESPONSIBILITY**

**Individual ministerial responsibility is vital to the democratic process as it ensures that someone, ultimately, is accountable for the actions of all public servants and services. There is debate about how valuable collective cabinet responsibility is to our system of government. Everyone is well aware that ministers must disagree at times over a variety of issues, so retaining an appearance of unity is simply insulting the intelligence of the public. Given the fact that ministers cheerfully 'leak' to further their own ends and block colleagues' aspirations, the time has come to end this unnecessary convention.**
