	<ul> <li>Cystic Fibrosis</li> <li>cystic fibrosis is caused by a defect in a gene called the cystic fibrosis transmembrane conductance regulator (CFTR) gene</li> <li>this recessive gene makes an (abnormal) protein that controls the movement of salt and water in and out of the cells in your body</li> <li>in people with CF, the gene does not work effectively</li> <li>this causes the thick, sticky mucus and very salty sweat that are the main features of CF</li> <li>hereditary patterns of inheritance</li> </ul>
