Answer all questions.

- 1 Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.
 - Source A The conspirators of August 1991 were without charisma and political sense. They had no political programme beyond a desire for the old Soviet order. Their press conference showed them as helpless, drunken and fearful men. The coup failed not because it met strong opposition, but because the
 - 5 country was descending into anarchy and no political movement was able to marshal sufficient force. The weak struggled against the weaker. People feared that Gorbachev was becoming a dictator, but in reality the country was suffering from the absence of all authority. Gorbachev's government could not solve the ever worsening problem of the economy, the decay of
 - 10 political institutions, and the forces of nationalism in this multinational union.

Source B

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Source C Gorbachev's policies were defective. Perestroika was built on false foundations. The Soviet Union was in a systematic decline when he took over, but he was unaware of this. The reforms accelerated decline.

Removing the party from economic management was catastrophic – it had been the glue keeping the whole system together. No alternative system was set up to replace it. Under Gorbachev, the Soviet Union hovered between the old and the new, between the past and the future.

How useful is **Source B** as evidence of the motives of the leaders of the coup?

(c) Use Sources A, B and C and your own knowledge.

'The failed coup only accelerated the inevitable process of the disintegration of the Soviet Union.'

How valid is this interpretation of Soviet instability since the death of Brezhnev in 1982? (20 marks)
