Question 1

Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

Source A A document written by Peter the Great in 1723, encouraging the development of factories

It is true that there are too few who are willing to participate. Our people are like children, who out of ignorance, will never get down to learning unless the teacher forces them to do so. At first they find it tedious, but when they learn their lesson they are grateful. It is the same with manufacturing: it is not enough to make
 5 proposals. This may happen in countries where there is already a firm tradition, but here an enterprise is sometimes set up but remains unfinished. It is necessary both to compel and to provide aid in the form of manuals, machines and other items and thus be a good ruler.

Source B Peter's goal was to create a class of Russian entrepreneurs. By tradition Russian noblemen looked down on any involvement in trade and industry and were determined not to invest in commercial enterprises. Peter employed a combination of persuasion and force, preaching the dignity and usefulness of commerce and
 5 making trade and industry an honourable form of state service. But Peter was not always sure what he wanted. When his attention wandered or he was distracted, those below him, uncertain as to his desires, did nothing and all activity stopped. His constant changes in direction and his detailed regulations which left no room for local adjustment, confused and drained initiative from Russian merchants and
 10 manufacturers.

Source C The effect of Peter's reforms was to strengthen and confirm the divisions of Russian society into Tsar, noble and serf. The preservation of the Russian social order had an adverse effect on Peter's economic plans. Russia lacked a large ambitious middle class equipped with money and skill. There was no free labour market and
 5 no free migration from country to town, since the entire labour force was bound in serfdom. The middle class made up barely 3% of the population and had no social prestige.
