Question 1

Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

Source A

Adapted from a report from Henry Cabot Lodge, US Ambassador to South Vietnam, to Secretary of State Dean Rusk, 29 August 1963

We are launched on a course from which there is no turning back: the overthrow of the Diem government. There is no turning back because there is no possibility that the war can be won under a Diem administration, still less that Diem can govern the country in a way that will gain the support of the people both in Vietnam and America.

5 I am in full agreement with the policy I was instructed to carry out. Vietnamese generals doubt that we have the determination to see this through. They think we will run out on them, even though we have told them that the game has started.

Source B

Adapted from a message from McGeorge Bundy, President Kennedy's National Security Adviser, to Ambassador Lodge, 5 October 1963

The President today approved the recommendations that no initiative should be taken to give any encouragement to a coup against Diem. There should, however, be urgent effort with the closest security to identify and build contacts with a possible alternative leadership, as and when it appears. It is essential that this effort be totally

5 secret and fully deniable by us. This effort is not to be aimed at the active promotion of a coup but only at surveillance and readiness. In order to make any denial believable, I suggest that you issue only oral instructions to your staff.

Source C

By August 1963, the war had become a critical problem for the USA. The Diem government's authority in large parts of the countryside had largely disappeared, and near chaos gripped many cities. Kennedy feared the possibility of premature negotiations for an end to the war. The Saigon government could not possibly

5 enter talks in an advantageous position given the political instability in the South and the increasing NLF strength. Kennedy seems to have believed that a change in government could speed up an American withdrawal. The new leaders would implement needed reforms, win increased popular support at the expense of the Vietcong and allow the United States to end its presence in Vietnam.
