#### Answer Question 1 and either Question 2 or Question 3.

- 1 Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.
  - **Source A** Adapted from a Soviet school textbook, published in 1976. The textbook states that collective farming made the peasants' lives better owing to improved technology and improved education.

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**Source B** Adapted from letters written in 1930 and 1931 and collected by Victor Serge, a member of the Left Opposition who was expelled from the Soviet Communist Party in the 1920s.

The collective farmers have received no pay for two months. Half the revenue goes to the farm treasury, the other half for taxes and rent. What remains for the workers? The poor wear out their clothes, and the collective farmers assert that a 'new serfdom' is being created. The peasants have no incentive to work. They have reacted to the forced

5 collectivisation by selling their possessions, sabotaging the work and revolting. The peasants rightly say: 'The Army is well fed and well dressed. It will not support us.'
