Source 1: From a report by the US Secretary of State, Dean Acheson, August 1949. In 1949, Acheson was in charge of an investigation into Sino-American relations. Here he is commenting on the civil war in China.

Our military observers in China have reported that it was not because the Guomintang lacked weapons or ammunition that its armies lost battles during the crucial year of 1948. The decay, which our observers had identified in Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's rule early in the war, had fatally shattered the powers of resistance of the Guomintang. Its leaders had proved incapable of meeting the crisis confronting them. Its troops had lost the will to fight and its government had lost popular support. 5

The Communists, on the other hand, through a ruthless discipline and fanatical zeal, attempted to promote themselves as guardians and liberators of the people. The Guomintang armies did not have to be defeated; they collapsed. History has proved again and again that a regime without faith in itself, and an army without morale, cannot survive the test of battle. 10

Source 2: From the imperial edict issued on behalf of the Dowager Empress Cixi by her ministers, January 1901. This official proclamation refers to the imperial government after the Boxer Rebellion.

We call upon the members of the Grand Council, the Grand Secretaries, the Six Boards and Nine Ministries, our ministers abroad, and the governor-general and governors of the provinces to reflect carefully on our present sad state of affairs. We desire them to examine Chinese and Western governmental systems. They must weigh up what should be kept in China and what should be abolished. They should consider what new methods should be adopted and what old ones retained. They must seek out how to renew our national strength, how to produce men of real talent, how to expand state revenues and how to revitalise the military. 15 20

The first essential thing, which is even more important than inventing new systems of governance, is to appoint men who can govern well. Without new systems, the corrupted old system cannot be salvaged. Without men of ability, even good systems cannot be made to succeed. Appropriate reforms must be introduced to clear away abuses. Then it will be necessary to select honourable and capable men to carry out the duties of office. Everyone, high and low – watch out! The Empress Dowager and we, her ministers, have long thought about these matters. Now things are at a crisis point and change must occur. Weakness must be transformed into strength. Everything depends on how change is implemented. 25 30
