Candidates should also consider the factors which may have influenced the way in which the interpretation has been formed – such as the type of historian/author, the evidence available to the historian/author and the date of the publication.

1. France, 1515-1547.

'Francis I's policies cannot be described as those of an absolute monarch.'

2. The Wars of Religion in France, 1562-1598.

3. The reign of Henry IV 1589-1610.
