In your answer to part (b) you are advised to evaluate the issue named in the question against a range of other important issues.

1. Wales and England in transition, c. 1880-1929

- (a) **Explain why** there was a General Strike in 1926. [24]
- (b) To what extent did war have the **greatest impact** on the lives of the people of Wales and England 1880-1929? [36]

2. British foreign policy, c. 1902-1939

- (a) **Explain why** there were tensions between Britain and Germany before 1914. [24]
- (b) To what extent was the fear of Russia the **most important influence** on British foreign policy between 1902-1939? [36]

3. Party politics, c. 1900-1940

- (a) **Explain why** the House of Lords was reformed in 1911. [24]
- (b) How far was the formation of coalition governments the **most important development** in British party politics from 1900-1940? [36]

4. The changing role and status of women, 1880-1929

- (a) **Explain why** the Suffragette movement gained support before 1914. [24]
- (b) To what extent was the First World War the **most influential factor** in changing attitudes towards the role and status of women 1880-1929? [36]
