- (b) To what extent was the dismissal of Bismarck in 1890 the MOST SIGNIFICANT INFLUENCE upon the development of Germany between 1878-1919?

- (a) EXPLAIN WHY the relationship between Church and State deteriorated after 1929. [24]
- (b) To what extent did the use of propaganda by the Fascists have the GREATEST IMPACT on the Italian people between 1922-1944? [36]

- 4. THE COMMUNIST REVOLUTION IN RUSSIA, c. 1917-1941
- (a) EXPLAIN WHY Stalin won the struggle for power in Russia between 1924-1929. [24]
- (b) To what extent was the peasantry the group MOST AFFECTED by the Communist Revolution in Russia in the period 1917-1941? [36]
