1. Russia during the reign of Peter the Great, 1696-1725

- (a) **Explain why** Peter the Great reformed the Russian Church. [24]
- (b) To what extent was the reform of the nobility the **most important development** of Peter the Great's reign, 1696-1725? [36]

2. Prussia during the reign of Frederick the Great, 1740-1786

- (a) **Explain why** there was rivalry between Prussia and the Hapsburg Empire during the reign of Frederick the Great. [24]
- (b) Were Frederick the Great's military achievements the **most important aspect** of his reign, 1740-1786? [36]

3. The Hapsburg Empire during the reigns of Charles VI and Maria Theresa, 1711-1780

- (a) **Explain why** the Treaty of Utrecht was important for the Hapsburg Empire. [24]
- (b) To what extent was the loss of Silesia the **most significant development** in the Hapsburg Empire during the period 1711-1780? [36]

4. International relations, c. 1710-1756

- (a) **Explain why** the Diplomatic Revolution took place. [24]
- (b) To what extent did the Great Northern War have the **most significant influence** on international relations 1710-1756? [36]
