

Source D

'I remember how disappointed we all were with the 1964 Act. It was meant to do so much for black people but the Act did not go far enough in guaranteeing our civil rights. Most state governments ignored the Act especially in the south and many employers found other ways of not giving black people jobs. There were riots in places like Chicago, acts of violence to show how angry we were after 20 years of campaigning.'
