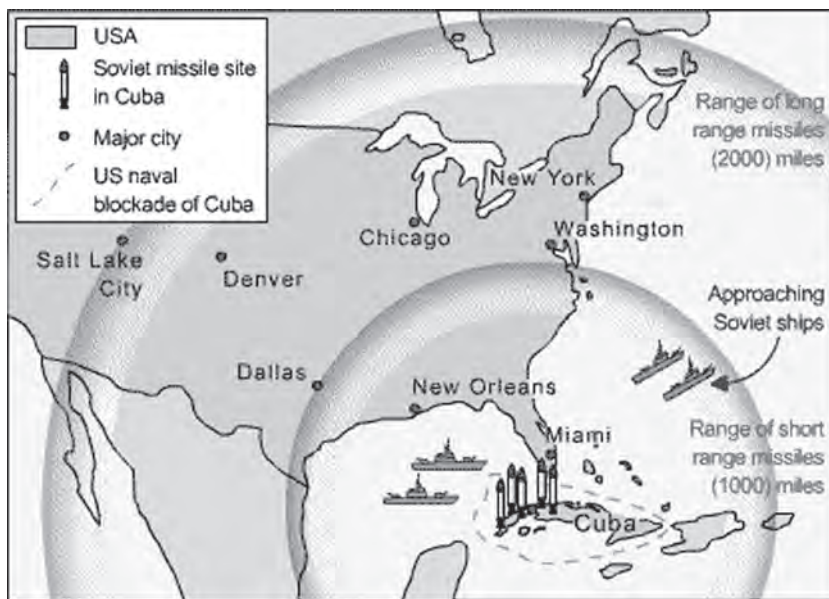

- (c) How useful is Source B to an historian studying the Soviet takeover of Eastern Europe? [4]
In your answer you should consider the content and origin of the source.

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Read Sources C and D. Then answer the question that follows.

Source C

‘Why are we in South Vietnam? We are there because we have a promise to keep. We promised to help South Vietnam defend its independence.’

(From a speech at a university in the USA, by American President Lyndon Johnson in 1965)

Source D

‘US involvement in Vietnam increased as part of their policy of containment in order to stop the spread of communism. The USA was not there to defend Vietnam.’

(From a GCSE textbook about twentieth century American History published in 2011)

- (e) Why do Sources C and D give different views about why the USA was involved in the Vietnam War? [6]
In your answer you should consider both the content of the sources and their authorship.

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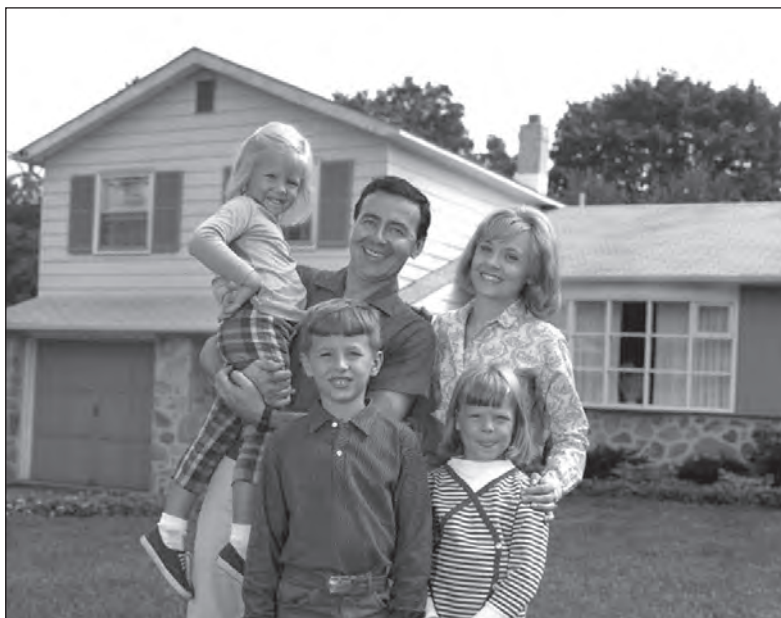
