Section B

Answer one question from this Section.

Butcher is the boss of an organised criminal gang. Butcher knows that Tony, a respected businessman, finances the activities of a rival criminal gang organised by Mad Max. Butcher wants to frighten Max off his 'patch' so he writes to Tony saying that unless Tony sets fire to Max's Ferrari car, he will 'cut up Julie', Tony's girlfriend, and will inform the police about Tony's criminal connections. Butcher encloses a photograph, taken last week, of Julie walking in her local park in order to demonstrate to Tony that the threat to Julie is real.

Tony goes to Ritzy's nightclub where he knows Max's car is parked. He has just started to pour some petrol on to the bonnet of the car when the car alarm is activated. In a panic, Tony runs away. He throws the can of petrol over a wall where it smashes glass in a greenhouse that was out of sight on the other side of the wall. The paintwork on the car bonnet is undamaged but Max pays a specialist car cleaning service £50 to have it cleaned and re-polished.

Discuss Tony's criminal liability for the above incidents.

Lizzie goes to her local shop which uses price stickers on most of its goods. She takes a bottle of perfume from a shelf and firstly places it in the trolley provided, intending to find a lower price sticker from another item in the shop. Thinking she is being watched by a store detective, Lizzie puts the bottle of perfume back on the shelf. She does, however, change the price label on an expensive bottle of whisky for one from a much cheaper brand. Confident that the detective is no longer watching, Lizzie returns to the perfumes and puts a bottle of perfume into her coat pocket.

When Lizzie goes to the checkout to pay for the whisky, the cashier, Adrian, notices that the price is incorrect. After a brief argument, Lizzie pays the amount on the original label. Adrian then notices the bottle of perfume sticking out of Lizzie's pocket. He challenges her about it. Lizzie runs out of the shop knocking over an elderly woman customer, Gladys, who is shaken but otherwise unhurt.

Discuss the liability of Lizzie for the above incidents.
