1 Read the passage and answer questions (a) and (b) which follow.

"In his account of Utilitarianism, Mill stressed the differences between 'higher' and 'lower' pleasures. As he said, 'It is better to be a human being dissatisfied than a pig satisfied; better to be Socrates dissatisfied than a fool satisfied'."

MILL, Utilitarianism, 1863, Chapter 2

(a) Explain what Mill meant by saying that certain pleasures were 'higher' than other pleasures.

- (b) There have been criticisms of Mill's approach to Utilitarianism. Identify and explain three such criticisms. (10 marks)
- 2 (a) Explain the views of one religion you have studied regarding the use of embryos in medical research. (15 marks)
 - (b) Explain how Bentham's theory of Utilitarianism could be used to defend the use of embryos in medical research, and assess how useful this attempt may be. (25 marks)
- **3** (a) Explain how Kant's ethical theories might be applied to the issue of abortion. (15 marks)
 - (b) Explain the views of **one** religion you have studied on the issue of abortion, and assess the view that neither Kant nor religion have anything helpful to say on the issue of abortion. (25 marks)
