Hinduism

Generally, reincarnation exhibits various features: first a human can be reborn in a variety of forms, whether in heaven as a god, or in a hellish purgatory, as a ghost, or as another life form, from insect to elephant. At the end of the day, she might achieve moksha or liberation from the round of rebirth. In this case there are varying possibilities: it might be an isolated, suffering-less existence; or it might be in some degree of intimate closeness to God, in a heavenly realm. A person who is liberated may have done it on her own, as in Samkhya-Yoga (though in this case she will have gained help from God); or it may be due entirely to God's grace... In the sramanic schools and in Samkhya, salvation is as it were dictated by the state of one's karma; while the theistic traditions treat karma as administered (so to speak) by God, and indeed it becomes itself an expression of God's grace.
