1.	(a)	Explain why some religious believers reject the use of Natural Law whilst other religious believers accept its use. [30]
	(b)	'Natural Law provides an excellent basis for making moral decisions.' Assess this view. [15]
2.	(a)	Outline the four working principles and six fundamental principles of Situation Ethics. [30]
	<i>(b)</i>	'Situation Ethics as a relativistic and teleological theory works well in today's society.' Assess this view. [15]
3.	(a)	Explain Bentham's Act Utilitarianism. [30]
	<i>(b)</i>	'Utilitarianism has too many weaknesses to make it useful.' Assess this view. [15]
4.	(a)	Explain the ethical teaching of one major world religion about sex between unmarried partners. [30]
	<i>(b)</i>	'In today's society religious responses to the issue of sex between unmarried partners are no longer relevant.' Assess this view. [15]
