2.	(a)	Examine how the teleological argument attempts to prove the existence of God.	[30]
	(b)	'The teleological argument for the existence of God is unpersuasive.' Assess this view.	[15]
3.	(a)	Explain what religious believers mean by the problem of evil.	[30]
	<i>(b)</i>	'The Irenaean theodicy solves the problem of evil for religious believers.' Assess this view.	[15]
4.	(a)	Examine the life and work of one religious mystic that you have studied.	[30]
	<i>(b)</i>	'There is no place for religious mystics in the world today.' Assess this view.	[15]
