	(<i>b</i>)	'Situation Ethics provides a poor basis for making moral decisions.' Assess this view.	[15]
3.	<i>(a)</i>	Explain the differences between Act and Rule Utilitarianism.	[30]
	<i>(b)</i>	'Utilitarianism is incompatible with a religious approach to ethics.' Assess this view.	[15]
4.	(a)	Examine the ethical teaching of one major world religion on marriage.	[30]
	(<i>b</i>)	'The rejection of marriage by many people is harmful to society.' Assess this view.	[15]
