	(b)	'No other pillar shows Muslim unity as clearly as sawm does.' Assess this view.	[15]
4.	(a)	Examine Muslim beliefs and practices in relation to birth rituals.	[30]
	(b)	'It is the centrality of Muslim family life that strengthens Islam.' Assess this view.	[15]

4.	(a)	Examine the beliefs and practices in relation to Jewish family life.	[30]
	(b)	'It is the mother's faith that shapes the future of Judaism.' Assess this view.	[15]
