Answer two questions from one section only, either Section A or Section B.

Section A: Introduction to the Old Testament

Answer two questions.

- 1. Examine the main characteristics of Old Testament apocalyptic literature. [30] (a) 'There is no difference between Old Testament prophetic literature and Old Testament (b) apocalyptic literature.' Assess this view. [15] Examine how the problems faced by the Israelites in Egypt and during the Exodus 2. (a) were solved. [30] 'The Exodus never happened.' (b) Assess this view. [15] 3. Examine the form and conditionality of God's covenant with Moses. [30] (a) (b) 'The biblical covenant with Moses is nothing like ancient Near Eastern treaties.' Assess this view. [15]
- **4.** (a) Examine the traditions reflected in the biblical accounts of the origins of the Hebrew monarchy. [30]
 - (b) 'Establishing a monarchy in Israel was a negative development.'[15]

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Section B: Introduction to the New Testament

Answer **two** questions.

1.	(a)	Examine the key themes in the accounts of Jesus' birth in Matthew and Luke. [30]
	(b)	'The differences between Matthew and Luke's account of Jesus' birth cannot be harmonised.' Assess this view. [15]
2.	(a)	Explain how Form Criticism has been used to interpret two parables that you have studied. [30]
	(b)	'The only aim of Jesus' parables was to teach his followers how to live.' Assess this view. [15]
3.	(a)	Examine the purposes of Matthew and Luke in their accounts of the miracle of the Healing of the Centurion's Servant. [30]
	(b)	'Miracles are the most important aspect of Jesus' ministry.' Assess this view. [15]
4.	(a)	Examine Luke's account of the crucifixion of Jesus. [30]
	(b)	'It is the resurrection of Jesus that matters, not his death.' Assess this view. [15]
