Your answers should refer to the extract as appropriate, but you should also include other relevant information.

- (a) Using the extract, briefly outline **two** trends across the three general election results. (4 marks)
- (b) Using the extract and your own knowledge, briefly explain the benefits of the 'First Past The Post' (FPTP) electoral system. (10 marks)
- (c) 'Fewer and fewer people are bothering to vote.' Assess some of the proposals that have been put forward to increase voter turnout. (16 marks)

EITHER

- 2 (a) Briefly examine, using examples, why some groups are more successful than others when campaigning to influence a political decision. (10 marks)
 - (b) 'There are virtually no differences between the ideologies of the major political parties in the UK today.' Assess this point of view. (20 marks)

OR

- 3 (a) Briefly examine, using examples, the argument that the media is too influential in setting the political agenda. (10 marks)
 - (b) 'A nice little earner for the semi-retired who have little influence over daily life in local communities.' To what extent is this an accurate description of local government councillors? (20 marks)
