- 4 Assess the strengths **and** limitations of the different types of interview that may be used in sociological research. [25]

#### Section C: Social Differentiation and Stratification

- 5 'Poverty is a stigma that prevents poor people from moving up the social ladder.' Discuss. [25]
- 6 Assess sociological explanations of why women continue to experience inequality in employment in modern industrial societies. [25]
