#### ITEM B

A Headteacher of a large comprehensive school in a deprived area is concerned that the take up of free school meals is very low.

You have been asked, as a sociological researcher, to design a research proposal that will target a representative sample of pupils eligible for free meals in that comprehensive school to find out the reasons for the low take up. The Headteacher requires **quantitative** data.

- (d) Outline and explain the research process that you would adopt in collecting **quantitative** data to find out why pupils who are eligible for free school meals choose not to have them. [14]
- (e) Assess the potential weaknesses of your research proposal, briefly explaining how you intend to overcome them. [22]
