## What are the benefits to me and my students of delivering this OCR specification?

- It reduces the assessment burden for students with the number of units reduced from six to four (two at AS, two at A2).
- Simple, straightforward assessment, with no coursework element.
- Research methodology is integrated into concepts and themes to allow it to be studied in context.
- Links are developed between substantive topics, sociological thought, methods of enquiry and the formation of social policy, particularly in the context of social inequality in the contemporary UK.

Unit title	Description	Mandatory/Optional?
Exploring socialisation, culture and identity	This unit looks at the formation of culture, the process of socialisation and its role in forming identity. It also explores the research process in context, exploring methods of data collection, analysis of data and research concepts. The examination will utilise pre-released material which will contain an adapted article or piece of research. The questions will be unseen but will relate to and develop concepts, themes and methods contained in the pre-release.	Mandatory
Topics in socialisation, culture and identity	The themes of culture and socialisation are developed through the study of a choice of one substantive topic from: Sociology of <b>the family</b> Sociology of <b>health</b> Sociology of <b>religion</b> Sociology of <b>youth</b> The unit explores the influence of these themes on the attitudes, values and social experiences of both individuals and society.	Mandatory

Unit title	Description	Mandatory/Optional?
Power and control	The themes of power and control are developed through the study of one substantive topic from: Sociology of <b>crime and deviance</b> Sociology of <b>education</b> Sociology of <b>the mass media</b> Sociology of <b>power and politics</b> Included within the topic area covered would be an overview of the theoretical approaches to the study of that topic.	Mandatory
Exploring social inequality and difference	This unit builds upon the knowledge and skills acquired to develop links between the nature of sociological thought and methods of sociological enquiry and core sociological themes such as power, social inequality, culture and identity.	Mandatory
