Black masculinities and schooling

In 1996 Tony Sewell conducted a major piece of research in what he called "Township School". This school was an 11-16 boys' comprehensive school with pupils coming from a range of ethnic backgrounds. Sewell adopted an **ethnographic approach**. He used semi-structured interviews and classroom observation to collect his data. He wanted to discover more about the experiences of Black boys in school and immersed himself in their everyday school life to gather rich data. At the time, Sewell who was in his early 30s, described himself as Black and said that he was able to mix with the boys and make good relationships with them. Sewell found that Black pupils were disciplined excessively and they received little positive recognition for their culture.
